



However generally a Very Good clean copy. *British Admiral Charles Colville Frankland (1792-1876) travelled from Vienna across south east Europe in 1827 when he was still a lieutenant in the Navy. The journey was extensive and lasted fifteen months. Frankland produced this account shortly after his return. 





The writer of these letters, Mrs Charles M. Afron, was evidently a lady of some standing in Columbia, South Carolina. With a lack of punctuation and her phonetic spelling (e.g. the Southern "adea" for "idea"), she describes the atrocities of the Civil War in horrifyingly graphic terms, in particular the surrender of Columbia:

"The shouts & yells of the negroes now assembled in thousands soon told us the Yankees were in the city, the mayor went out to meet them, & surrendered one of the most beautiful citys in the U.S...our enemy entered, the hated flags waving, the loud & long cheers ringing through the air, the negroes shouts of welcom all pierced us to the heart...the whole city was now set on fire, 84 squares, 2/3 of the city was burned to the ground- the soldiers went from house to house setting them on fire, in every room, scarcely giving one time to get out, if you attempted to save anything they would snatch it from you & throw [it] into the flames..."

"I never for a moment doubted that victory would not be ours," Afron notes in the conclusion of her letter, "our poor soldiers endured every privation that man could live through but god is my judge I would rather be a Southern Pauper than a Yankee millionaire..."


The burning of Columbia has engendered controversy ever since, with some claiming the fires were accidental, a deliberate act of vengeance, or perhaps set by retreating Confederate soldiers who lit cotton bales while leaving town. The correspondent here lays the blame squarely on the Yankees, perhaps adding further flames to the controversy. **£3,500**


**10. DU CHAILLU, Paul Belloni** Autograph Letter, signed. *August 20th 1864.* Autograph letter on 4 sides, each 210 x 135 mm. signed in full. *Addressed to Dr [Henry] Bence Jones, noted English physician and chemist, a chatty and informative letter written on the eve of one of his visits into the interior of Africa. Du Chaillu is best remembered as the first European to confirm the existence of gorillas, a defining fact which obviously caused him some irritation "I am perfectly tired of the Gorilla business and I intend to have nothing to do with the beast in the future." He later 'discovered' the pygmy people of central Africa as well a number of previously unknown species.* **£650**





William Conway (1856 -1937) developed an interest in mountaineering whilst at Cambridge and became a member of the Alpine Club in 1877. Although a typical Victorian in his wide ranging interests, he was a keen bibliophile and a lover of the fine arts, later becoming Roscoe Professor of Art at University College, Liverpool. Conway was in no sense an amateur climber. He took as his model Edward Whymper's expedition to the Great Andes of the Equator, which had already demonstrated how a scientific mountaineering expedition should be organised, and the importance Conway attached to the separately published scientific reports clearly reflects


this ambition. As W.A.B. Fine. *The Asiatic Petroleum Company was a joint venture between the Shell and Royal Dutch oil companies and was founded in 1903. It operated throughout Asia from the start of the 20th. Century with its headquarters on the Bund in Shanghai. This map would appear to reflect the growing market for oil products throughout China, a market which, by the start of the Second World, had expanded to over 1000 sales outlets across some 20 provinces.* 

Edwin Dingle, who was responsible for this map along with H.J.Fruin, lived in China for over twenty years and in 1917 published The New Atlas and Commercial Gazetteer of China which served as the standard reference for many years and was described as the "biggest and best book on the resources of China." A rare and highly detailed commercial map of China.

The box containing the map is stamped " Travelling Engineer" which suggests that only a limited number of copies would have been produced specifically for the Asiatic Petroleum Co., thus accounting for its scarcity.



The letter reads "Dear Madam, I am grateful to you for your very kind wishes and also for the St. Christopher's medal which I shall surely carry with me. I am confident I shall be spared to write another book on my life's work and I trust the pages will afford you as much interest as those of 'South'. I enclose a card and invite you to visit the 'Quest' any morning after Wednesday next. Again thank you. Believe me yours sincerely, E.H. Shackleton."

The letter is dated 21st. August 1921, three weeks before Shackleton left on the Quest for his last expedition. He suffered a heart attack on board and died on the 5th. January 1922.


Leonard Hussey, who was the meteorologist on the expedition and who was responsible for accompanying Shackleton's body to its burial in the Norwegian cemetery on South Georgia, wrote two letters to Mrs. Robertson. The first, dated 19.9.43 reads "Dear Mrs. Robertson, Thank you so much for your kind letter. It was so nice to hear from one who takes such a real interest in our work. It seems to make it all so much more worth while when we know that our efforts are understood and appreciated. I consider it the greatest privilege of my life that I was allowed to work under Sir Ernest. In the opinion of those who knew him and lived with him he was the greatest and most human Englishman of all time. Once more very many thanks. Yours sincerely, L. Hussey." The second letter, dated 20.11.47 reads "Dear Mrs. Robertson, Thank you for your kind letter. I am so glad to hear that you are helping me to keep Sir Ernest's memory alive. If you would like more about him, write to the Programme Director, the BBC. London, and they will no doubt arrange further talks about him. Best wishes in your good work, yours sincerely. L.Hussey."



Having resigned as first chief inspector of antiquities in 1905 Howard Carter was unable to return to Egypt until early 1909 when he began his association with George Herbert, fifth earl of Carnarvon. For the next five years they excavated in the Theban necropolis making important, if unspectacular, discoveries. In 1915 Carnarvon was encouraged by Carter to apply for the concession for the Valley of the Kings, one that had been surrendered by Davis and thought by Maspero to be unpromising. Carter thought otherwise. It was not, however, until 1917, after a spell as a civilian employed by the intelligence department of the War Office in Cairo, that Carter was able to conduct annual campaigns in the Valley of the Kings. Few positive results were achieved


and in the summer of 1922 Carter had to use all his powers of persuasion to be allowed to conduct one final campaign in the valley. On 4 November 1922, starting work at first light, Howard Carter opened the stairway that led to the tomb of Tutankhamun. His excitement was reflected in the now famous telegram to Carnarvon. "At last have made wonderful discovery in Valley. A magnificent tomb with seals intact." Carnarvon hurried to Luxor and the tomb was entered on 26 November.

The discovery astounded the world: a royal tomb, full of spectacular objects. On 16 February 1923 the burial chamber was opened to reveal the unplundered body and funerary equipment of the dead king. Despite "handling the technical processes of clearance, conservation, and recording with exemplary skill and care" and presiding over a discovery which reverberated across the world, Carter received no formal honours from his own country.

One of the first people Carter contacted after entering the tomb was Harry Burton, an accomplished art photographer who had gained valuable experience working on the Metropolitan Museum's excavations in Thebes. It proved to be an inspired choice. For not only was Burton able to create a series of remarkable images with what would now be considered as primitive equipment, these images, some 1400 in number, illuminate the excavations and excite the imagination in a way which transcends the text. Burton's photos are more than just a record of the excavation of the tomb. His attention to lighting, texture and composition make them works of art in their own right, capturing as they do the excitement of the greatest archaeological discovery of the twentieth century.

Although we have handled several copies of this work which have been inscribed by Carter, we have been unable to locate a copy bearing Burton's name. **£3,750**

Cork pictures of this size are extremely unusual and would only have been undertaken by the most skilled artists. We are fortunate that in this case we have the details of both the artist and place of creation, as well as the true title of the piece. It is uncommon to be able to ascribe pieces to particular workshops or artists. Artist: CHAN Tim Fat

Place: Changle, Fujian

Title: Dawn on the Su Causeway in Spring. It is not clear why the English title reads Hangchow and (Shanghai) as they are two distinct places in China: the Su Causeway is in Hangzhou (Hangchow). Perhaps the people presenting it didn't think that the recipient would know the difference! The Su Causeway was built by the eponymous Su Dongpo in the 11th Century and "Dawn on the Su Causeway in Spring" became a classic view, one of the recommended attractions for visitors to the region.

The art of cork carving is a relatively recent one, according to popular tradition, having been started in Fuzhou close to Changle in Fujian province in around 1910, although it was not until the import of landscape pictures from Germany in around 1913 or 1915 that the pioneers incorporated the Chinese aesthetic with the western to create cork landscapes. The 1930s saw the next step from postcard-sized simple carvings to the larger bas-relief examples [one of which we have here]. Although we have been unable to trace the artist with the tools to hand it is possible that searches on Chinese media would be able to track down both the workshop and artist. Certainly he was a master of his craft and he was in all likelihood one of the pioneers of the expansion of this art form. Nowadays cork sculptures have been debased, with many being mass produced and machine made. To find a large, early, unique, dated and signed example with a traceable provenance must be unusual; I have been unable to trace anything similar. **£7,500**

#### THE ARCHAEOLOGIST AS PHILOSOPHER

HOWARD CARTER AND THE MYSTERIOUS MISS IONIDES.26. CARTER, Howard Autograph Letter, Signed. *Athens: Hotel de la Grande* 

Bretagne, 10th September, 1933. 4 page autograph letter, signed. "Who would a poet understand must first visit the poet's land."

To be in Athens is to realize how the unfettered life of an ant, obeying all the laws of nature, grew, blossomed, faded and alas died. So much is it the case that one wonders whether such marvels were due to any mortal hand, or to the Gods themselves. However, they tell us that this and that was made at such and such a time, or in such and such a moment, and they even stick labels thereon. Phew! Who cares. Fancy Nature labelling her rose. Was then an art created to Bradshaw? Or was it not under suitable conditions, true environment, that the nursery well raised her child?

In the harbour the wee "Ophrus," (renamed ?) bubbles like a cork. With a sturdy Captain and crew of eleven we board her tomorrow and plough the waves to the isles in the sea. With every kind thought to Miss Stevens and yourself. Yours sincerely, Howard Carter.

Perhaps better known as "Kolokithi."

The nature of Carter's relationship with the shadowy Miss Ionides remains sadly elusive. Although both letters betray what is presumably a shared intimacy this particular letter, at once wistful and lyrical, reveals a different Carter to the difficult, brooding man known to the public. This is the man who was involved in an altercation with a group of French tourists in Egypt and who went to the High Court to prevent a certain Sheik Quraishi from selling Tutankhamen perfume bearing Carter's name.

One is tempted to conclude that the famously guarded archaeologist was at heart a romantic individual and that the sentiments expressed here are what motivated him to continue searching for the tomb of Tutankhamen long after being warned that it was an impossible undertaking.

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
